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

LETTER FROM YOUR DEAN

Dear colleagues and friends,





We can all enjoy the beauty, complexity and wonderful construction of a Bach fugue while seated alone at console of the organ in an empty space; but how much better that fugue becomes when shared with someone else, or with a group of music lovers. It is this very act of sharing of our love of the instrument, the beauty of the music, the supporting of each other and educating others and our community that is the very essence of the AGO.

A lot of things come to mind about this most recent successful presentation:

the two people who worked diligently for months to assure that every little detail was attended to;

the very busy organists who, when asked to help fill out the program played not one, but two pieces from repertoire;

the time it took to prepare a history and slide show of the organ's past;

the organ students who tempered youthful exuberance and enthusiasm and competently performed compositions of exquisite beauty;

the musicians who prepared something 'special' for the event;

the very helpful folks of First Christian Church who graciously provided support, materials, and assistance even to the use of their video system to display our per formers in the organ pit;

the woodwind players who helped in our 'show and tell;'

and our favorite organ technician who, when asked, supplied not a couple of organ pipes, but a whole panoply of examples;

the teachers who went out of their way to help students prepare for this event; and the joy of seeing a youngster successfully perform for the first time in public.

We all lead very busy, very complicated lives...so it's easy to plead "I'm so busy" when asked to participate, assist or help out in an AGO event. And it is true that prior commitments can interfere with our ability to participate. But even just showing up to support other musicians in performance is an important part of what the AGO is all about.

Those members, their invited guests and the audience who did 'show up' got the opportunity to hear little Peter Schesseele perform two little pieces from memory ... at 4 1/2 years old. Peter heard the King of Instruments last year, liked it so much he wanted to 'try out the organ' after the concert. He subsequently talked mom into taking him on our organ crawl of Albany and Salem to see more organs. He came to hear our dueling pipe organs concert.

While on the organ crawl, Peter met Craig Hansen of OSU, who accepted him as a student, and he has been taking lessons for the last 9 months! His performance amazed us all, inspired us, and really demonstrates the importance of passing on our love for the organ and its music, and the value of the educational component of our organization.

So how do you measure 'success' of a program like Introduction to the King of Instruments? Well, there are probably lots of ways, these come to mind in this instance: (Cont'd on Page 2)

the joy of the musicians who performed;

the mutual support the musicians gave one another;

the dedication of the music lover who shows up to record and preserve our event;

the enthusiasm of the audience to our presentations; the fact that so many came up to offer compliments on performances, and to say how interesting the program was and how much they had learned;

and the large number of people who came up to look at the organ console, and stayed long after the program was 'over' to see the organ pipe samples, to ask quest ions and to share their enthusiasm and appreciation for what they had just experienced;

and of course, a nice large audience ... including many for whom this was their first AGO event.

Finally, one of the nicer things about Facebook is the little sayings and quotations that people like to share: often inspirational, sometimes funny. This one caught me, made me think, and I think it's worth sharing with you, my music loving friends: "Music is what feelings sound like."

THIS MONTH'S PROGRAM

This month's chapter program presentation is by our Sub-Dean, Dr. Jane Knobel. We prevailed upon this normally quiet, very reserved lady to share her considerable love of English music with us. Jane did her masters and doctorate on the subject of historical investigation of sacred music pre-Christian to 1850 including psalms and hymnody. Jane has lived and taught in 5 countries, and maintains a home in the UK and here in Eugene.

English church music is rich in traditions that most of us are not terribly familiar with, and her presentation and handouts will outline the historical perspectives of their sacred music tradition which can be traced to ancient times.

You will be able to listen to rich choral and pipe organ music from English cathedrals, sing 2 English hymns and gain a broad picture of this beautiful old tradition still practiced in England. A 16-page paper will be provided as a handout to attendees.

The presentation will take place at the Springfield Church of Christ, Scientist on Friday, February 17 at 8 PM, (at 1176 Centennial Blvd). This is a new venue for our chapter, and will be our first time visiting there. Attendees will have an opportunity to meet "Mr. Rodgers," a newly installed organ donated to the church by Jane. Mark your calendar to be sure to hear this program. This is one presentation not to be missed!

Oregon Keyboard Institute July 15-19, 2013

What is the Oregon Keyboard Institute?

The Oregon Keyboard Institute is a week in the beautiful city of Eugene, Oregon, enjoying instruction in organ and harpsichord for adults (18 years and older). There will be classes for beginners (who should be proficient pianists) interested in learning the basics of organ and harpsichord techniques, as well as classes for more advanced players who wish to expand their repertoire and technique.

Class time will include basics in hymn playing and continuo. Participants may choose to study either or both instruments. Only a limited number of participants can be accepted, so early application is recommended.

The week will consist of individual instruction in organ and harpsichord, master classes, faculty and guest recitals, as well as instruction in harpsichord tuning and maintenance. At the conclusion of the week there will be a concert featuring Institute participants.

Full Participant Tuition for the full week is \$375. This includes daily instruction, admission to concerts, seminars and workshops and the closing catered meal. Housing and other meals are not included.

Daily Auditor Tuition is \$75 per day. This includes attendance and observation of the day's concerts, seminars and workshops. Eugene Chapter members may audit for \$50 / day.

Deadline for application is May 1, 2013. Registration is limited to 20 participants. No refunds will be given after June 15. A \$50 non-refundable fee must accompany the completed application. This fee will be applied to the tuition.


